Public Forum:

With no guests in the audience, Mayor Winkler closed the public forum and moved on to Council Reports.

Council Reports:

Mr. Humphries:

1. He wanted to say there is a lot of road crew activity going on in Carlisle. There are a lot of utility poles being wired and multiple poles will be removed and new ones put in so there's a lot of

- one-way traffic so if everyone could do our best to pay attention to the people that are directing traffic and let's let those people go home safely.
- 2. Mental wellness Just to remind everybody with the holidays coming up, the days being shorter and darkness being longer, dial 988. We'd more than welcome to hear your complaints and issues in your life than to talk about what we could have done different so 988 for mental wellness if you have some challenges in your life.

Mr. Stivers:

 Just wanted to let everyone know as it gets colder wild animals in our area and specifically he's seen a couple of coyotes on a couple different occasions and as food gets more scarce and it gets colder, if you have small animals when you let them out at night maybe stay with them and don't let them out for too long because especially with small pets as they could easily become a target.

Mr. Kilpatrick:

Nothing to report.

Mr. Bicknell:

- 1. They had the JEMS meeting last week. Things are moving along quite well. If you've noticed all the scaffolding and everything was removed today where you could see the front doors and everything so that's 90% done. Exterior walls were starting today so hopefully by the end of the week, barring any weather, you'll see the exterior structure of the framing starting to go up. Hopefully by next week we're hoping to have the concrete poured into the bay doors and that will have a good time to set, and then we'll start moving. With that inside they did build a wall above the tornado shelter to start putting some stuff around there to keep there for right now.
- 2. For the September runs, he doesn't know if Council received those but for the month of September there were 38 incidents in Carlisle; a total of 174 within the jurisdiction; we gave 41 mutual aids and only needed to receive 2 mutual aids. The two we received assistance on wasn't due to short staffing but rather due to all of our apparatuses being out servicing the citizens so we needed extra care to come in.
- 3. We are entering the cold months and it's darker, so pay attention with school drop offs. We do have a lot of kids walking on Fairview and we have no sidewalks there so please pay a lot of attention to your surrounding areas. He would encourage parents if your kids do walk have them wear something with high visibility in the morning whether it be a light on their backpack or a vest though he knows that's not fashionable but it's more safe. Then we need to pay attention even at night time for events because our community has a lot of kids that live close enough to do a lot of walking so we want to make sure we're always paying attention. Mr. Stivers added to tell your kids to walk against traffic also and Mr. Bicknell reiterated yes, walking against is better than with traffic.

Mrs. Kemper:

- 1. With the holidays coming up the next several months she wanted to share Save the Dates as there's a lot of things going on in Carlisle over the next few months.
 - a. Trunk or Treat is Sunday, October 29th from 4:00 6:00 PM over at the Carlisle School parking lot. That is sponsored by Valley Real Estate and The Church in the Village.
 - b. Beggar's Night is Tuesday, October 31st from 6:00 8:00 PM.
 - c. The Lions Club is going to be having a Holiday Bazaar on Sunday, November 5th from 1:00 5:00 PM.
 - d. Carlisle's Christmas Tree Lighting and Santa is on Monday, November 27th at 6:00 PM. It's a little earlier this year due to Santa being very busy.
 - e. We will also be doing the Holiday at Home decorating contest again this year and will have more details on that later.

Mr. Faulkner:

Nothing to report.

With that, Mayor Winkler closed the Council Report and moved on to the Mayor's Report.

Mayor's Report:

- 1. He was contacted by the Mayor of Springboro and also the Mayor of Franklin regarding November 11th is Veteran's Day, so we're going to do a 3-community Veteran's Day Recognition. The Mayor of Springboro approached me with this while we were in Washington DC. He has since spoken with the Village Station Bar & Grill. We're going to do a Pancake Breakfast for all Veteran's on Saturday, November 11th. It will be a free meal so we encourage all Veteran's to come to the Village Station Bar & Grill. We're still working out a few of the details but he's assuming it's going to be around 9:00 AM.
- 2. He would also like to encourage all of our residents that since cold weather is coming on and some folks are firing up their furnaces. If you haven' had an opportunity to get your furnace checked out you might want to do so to make sure we don't get any carbon monoxide calls for anyone and make sure your furnace filters have been changed and your furnace is in good working condition before you fire it up.

Mayor Winkler closed the Mayor's Report and moved on to the City Manager's Report.

Manager's Report:

 Mrs. Kemper had already mentioned the Trunk or Treat. He wanted to mention the Carlisle Police Department will be there handing out candy. The Chief wanted him to make sure and mention that.

- 2. Chief also wanted Mr. Lohr to mention that in Lebanon there's going to be a National School Bus Safety launch on October 13th. The Police Department will be in attendance. As most know, we had a tragic bus accident earlier in the year, so with next week being School Bus Safety Week there's obviously a lot of importance placed on that.
- 3. We are still working on the Authority Tax Upgrade. We're still on track to have that live sometime in November so that will be our last CMI Module that we're upgrading to the Authority version.
- 4. We're also upgrading the way we accept Credit Card payments. With the company we are changing to we will be able to take online payments for everything we do and not just utility payments so we'll be able to receive payments for Mayor's Court, park shelter rentals, and that sort of thing. With that he wanted to mention with this new company there is going to be a convenience fee. Previously the City has absorbed that cost but with the new service there'll be a 3.5% that will be paid directly by the resident. Mr. Kilpatrick asked if there's a way to accept ACH payments with that software. Mr. Lohr didn't know but can research further and get an answer.
- 5. They are still working on the generator for the Police Department and Service Building. That was budgeted at about \$50,000 for this year. We have one quote that came in at about \$53,000; we're getting a second quote and may pursue a third one to see if we can get to that \$50,000 mark, but that's something we are hoping we can still get rolling on this year.

Ms. Cooper stated the reason it is on tonight for an Emergency is because the temp agreement we signed with the schools only a 30-day turnaround between us receiving the funds and paying the schools so that's why it has to be passed as an Emergency. Mr. Faulkner asked would she be able to share two times of year the dates that it usually happens? Ms. Cooper stated sometime in April and sometime in September generally. Mr. Faulkner added he really appreciated the summary sheet she provided that showed the Property Tax disbursements between that and what the TIF Funds actually got. Mr. Kilpatrick asked is there a way for us to avoid an Emergency by having us pass some legislation at the beginning of the year for that kind of thing or do we have to wait until it comes in to pass the legislation? Ms. Cooper said they are looking at opening up blanket Purchase Orders, but the problem is we reimburse the schools based on how much we receive.

Mayor Winkler asked for a motion to suspend the rule requiring three readings, have one reading by title only and declaring an emergency. Mr. Faulkner made a motion, seconded by Mr. Kilpatrick.

ORDINANCE 24-23: ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY CREDIT AND DEBIT CARD POLICY ON FOR A 3rd AND FINAL READING.

Mr. Lohr stated he knows we have talked about this previously but currently, our credit card policy states we are very limited in the way we can use them so right now the Finance Director stays in control of the cards, and we can distribute them to employees for use during the day, however, that has created some operational difficulties. We would like to transition to the proposed credit card policy that allows us to issue credit cards to Department Heads and specify which employees will have that. Then the check for that is we will have somebody responsible for keeping track of those credit cards as well as compiling quarterly reports to make sure that we're using them appropriately. Mr. Faulkner asked would that person be Ms. Cooper. Mr. Lohr stated the way that the law is written it cannot be a card holder so our plan is that he would designate the Finance Clerk so we would have that independent person reviewing all the records. Mr. Faulkner asked is it a problem if the Clerk works for the Finance Director? Mr. Lohr stated no.
