Work Session Minutes of January 18, 2022 were approved.

Public Forum:

Linda Oda, Warren County Recorder, approached Council. She attended the Franklin Chamber luncheon last month and spoke to Mrs. Bilbrey. At that luncheon, she spoke of the Recorder's Office property fraud notification service and Mrs. Bilbrey thought it would be a good thing to make Carlisle residents aware. Many news stations are advertising for companies who will keep track of your property records for \$14.95 per month. This is a service that is free through the Warren County Recorder's Office. If anyone tries to file anything against your property address, this service will make you aware of it so you can take proper action. This service has been free through the county for over eight years. She handed out annual report pamphlets to Council and audience members that has more information about the fraud alert service on the reverse. As County Recorder, she keeps track of all land records within Warren County. There are over 30 million documents in her purview and everything is accessible electronically through www.warrencountyrecorder.com. The only records not currently available online are those of veterans. All discharge papers are recorded for all veterans at no charge and future certified copies will be accessible at no charge. They also have a mobile Veterans Services van that can come to events and provide that extra service. They can also issue state ID cards which can be used in place of a driver's license. As far as the property fraud, she wishes that everyone could promote this service as Warren County has more residents utilizing this service than in any other county in the state. To new homeowners, it is not a requirement to keep a copy of your deed in your home. Many residents will receive information in the mail soon after a home closing instructing them of the opposite and try to get money for this but it is a free service through the county. It is quick to sign-up and will offer you notification of any property fraud within 24 hours. Individuals are able to place a mechanic's lien against your home without your notification. Most homeowners can be unaware of such things for years. The service will not stop the recording process but it will give you time to take the proper steps to stop it. As the Warren County Recorder's Office annual report, she is very proud to say that have over 75% of their documents available electronically. When the pandemic hit, they did not shut down where other counties shut down for months. They have been able to work as normal with no delays due to that high electronic work load. She appreciates Council allowing her to stop by and give them this information.

Mayor Winkler thanked Mrs. Oda for stopping in. Mrs. Bilbrey asked if military DD214 forms could only be filed in Warren County. Mrs. Oda explained that veteran state issued IDs are available in just a few counties including Warren county but that all counties are required, by law, to record all DD214 forms. Mrs. Bilbrey would like to promote this service to all local veterans given our location with Wright Patterson Air Force Base. Mrs. Oda explained that DD214 forms can be recorded in multiple counties for convenience. Mr. Kilpatrick thanked Mrs. Oda for the property fraud information and explained that he will speak about that tonight during his Facebook live recap of tonight's meeting. He feels this will be a great source of help for many people where most of their net worth is tied up in their homes.

Mr. William Bohle of 5529 Dorothy Ct. approached Council. He recently received a first half property tax bill by mistake and he called the county treasurer's office due to something that he questioned on that bill. They told him they could not help but referred him to the county auditor's office. He was told that they send the bill to Carlisle and what happens from there is up to that city. He is sure that everyone in Morris Farms area is getting the same charge for street lights. There are no street lights in

Morris Farms and most of that area is terribly dark. He is curious to the charge of \$22.93 when there are no street lights in the subdivision. Most of the other subdivisions within Carlisle do have street lights and he wouldn't mind the charge if he had street lights where he lived.

Mayor Winkler stated that he would be more than happy to look into this and get him an answer. Mr. Bohle also mentioned that he has been on the tax council and they have not had a meeting in over two years. He has been doing taxes and offering services for taxes since 1962. He does not feel that is fair that Carlisle asks for the taxes to be due on the 18th and then penalize you \$25 when they are not in by the close of business that day. Federal, State, and School District taxes are all available for online filing and can be filed up until 11:59 pm on the 18th. He feels that doing city income taxes takes him as long as the other three but it is not available online, requires first page of 1040 as well as Schedule 1 of 1040. He would like to see Carlisle change their deadline to one day later or accept tax filings to be placed in the drop box up until 11:59pm on the 18th.

Mr. Humphries explained that our tax office, for several years, has accepted filings to be on time if they are in the box the next morning by 8:00am. Mr. Bohle detailed how in his previous employment, he and staff would postmark tax filings with the day before if they were dropped in mailboxes overnight of the deadline. He thanked Council for their time and consideration.

Mr. Bo Singer of 219 Sheri Lane approached Council. He is here to speak about the tax issue. He was also present at the December meeting when it was tabled. He has read some of the Facebook posts concerning the different avenues that have already been tried. He has been in Carlisle for 40 years and his wife for 60 years and they have raised two children here as well as now eight grandchildren. He tells everyone that he cannot think of any other place better to raise a family. He was happy with the outcome of the meeting in December and he has been reading Council's options that were posted. He feels that a majority of the residents in Carlisle do not know what will happen if this issue passes. The ones that do realize it are very few and that is sad. Unfortunately, most people don't know what is happening until it over and done and then they are disgruntled. He asked Council if they want a large amount of disgruntled people here in the Village.

Mayor Winkler commented that he does not want disgruntled people here. He has been here most all of his life. It is sad that our government is structured the way that it is, in his opinion. He wishes that people paid their taxes where they lived versus where they worked. The Governor that we had prior to our current one took away local government funds, he stripped the communities of their revenue that left us with trying to come up with ways to collect revenue to support our services. We have now looked the other way for so many years that we are now at a point where we can't anymore. He doesn't want disgruntled people but he certainly doesn't want disgruntled people because they need services that are no longer there. Mr. Singer stated that there are other options out there but he will not go into that for arguments sake because he only sees black and white. The majority of the people don't know what is going on but they will be disgruntled if this passes. Mayor Winkler feels that it is sad more people don't take an interest in their community. He wishes that they did. He talks to people all the time when he is out in the community and believes he is very approachable. Some people just don't want to hear it and definitely don't want to talk about it. Mayor Winkler is not sure if this issue will pass or if it will even come off of the table. He is passionate about this community as he raised his family here and now they are raising theirs here as well. He wants this community to be safe and right now we are in a situation where we need to support our police department. In years past, we have run

levies to raise the income tax and it was defeated. Police levies have been run and defeated twice. He showed a dollar bill and how it is broken down by taxes. Out of every dollar paid in property taxes, 73% goes to the schools (a 1% income tax also goes to the school district), 9% goes to special districts, 8% goes to the county, 5% goes to the joint vocational school, 1% goes to Franklin Township and the City of Carlisle gets 4%. This is not a whole lot of money to work with. Mr. Singer asked if this was something that the seven Council Members should decide or should the residents of Carlisle get to make that decision. Mayor Winkler explained that the city cannot run a levy. It would need to be the seven council members that run the levy and pay individually for those costs. He has been a part of that in past years, taking money from his pocket for signs, arranging meetings and no one shows up. They held several meetings in various locations around the city and, on most occasions, were the only ones in attendance. He feels that they have done their due diligence by asking the people in years past and they have always turned it down. This is now the tool in the box and council will decide whether or not to use it. He told of a situation at his home a couple years ago where he and his wife were scared by a stranger knocking on their door. His wife called dispatch several times with no police showing up due to our one officer being on another call at the time. When there is only one officer on duty, it can cost time in keeping residents safe. When residents need help, they don't want to have to wait for mutual aid to be called. He is hoping that, if this does pass, it will give us more resources, not by expansion but by not having only one officer on a duty assignment. Chief Rogers has been able to take a new approach to scheduling that is helping during some periods but not for all shifts. He does not believe that the residents in this community understand the need in our police department. That department will be going into a deficit, and, at some point, cuts will need to be made and there is not fat to be trimmed. We can only provide services equal to the money they give us. If this issue fails and we have to cut services, he hopes it doesn't turn out bad for anyone in our community. Mr. Singer commented that he was simply here to represent the people. Mayor Winkler really appreciates him being here and taking the time to speak with him.

Mr. Kilpatrick asked if Mr. Singer is more in favor of a levy going on the ballot. Mr. Singer stated that a levy is just one option. He feels the budget for sewer is a bit fat. Mr. Humphries explained that you cannot move funds from one to another. Mr. Singer stated that he pays for water that he does not get because he is on a well. When he lived on Tiffany, he paid for water and received it. Since moving to Sheri, he does not get water but still pays for water. Mayor Winkler commented that there is roughly \$2 million in the sewer fund and it has taken twenty years to get to that amount. To put it in perspective, there is a future project coming up on State Route 123 that we have applied for funding to help offset those costs of but, if we don't get that funding, it will cost \$1 million for the upgrades to the sewer line. This is even a short run of sewer line between Crescent and Phil's Auto. He does not feel that over charging for services is an issue when it is not fat in comparison to what repairs currently cost. Mr. Singer stated that they will have to agree to disagree and leave it at that. Mayor Winkler thanked him for coming out.

Mr. William Bohle asked Council what issue this conversation was referring to. Mayor Winkler explained the issue that was tabled in December. The legislation would amend the Carlisle Taxation Code. If you work outside of Carlisle, you pay tax to the city in which you work and Carlisle has always forgiven the tax paid there so additional was not paid here. For example, he works in Centerville and pays 2.5% there so he pays nothing in Carlisle. Within the state code, we can allow to not forgive all of that tax so that people who live here would have to pay here as well as where they work. That is why

he made the earlier comment about wishing you paid where you lived versus where you worked. Mr. Bohle explained that he agrees with that and now understands the conversation.

Mr. Junior Cope of 291 Cora Drive approached Council. He has lived here for 48 years. He wanted to express his disheartening with the tax issue. He agrees that more than 90% of the people in this city do not know what is happening. He has been a plow driver for 15 years and he understands. He reads Facebook but does not comment. He backs the "blue". It is his understanding that we need \$400,000 for the police and the tax that they are asking for will be double that. If you were asking for what you need, then it might be easier. He would like to suggest going for .5% versus 1% because it seems like a big chunk all at once. Mayor Winkler explained that beginning this year, they will be putting \$412,000 into the police fund from the general fund to make them whole. The police does get .5% of the 1.5% that we currently collect and the general fund gets 1%. It is estimated to go up by 5% next year for the police subsidization. By 2025, we will be in a deficit with our police fund. Mr. Cope explained that he understands that you can't move money from one fund to another and knows what buckling down means. He knows that Mr. Casson does amazing work with what he has but it seems like the city is asking for a lot all at once and most residents don't even know it is coming. Mayor Winkler thanked him for coming out this evening.

Mrs. Rebecca Singer of 219 Sheri Lane approached Council. She just wanted to mention how this tax issue will also hurt the companies here in Carlisle. If taxes do go up, then some of the places here in Carlisle will not be supported because residents won't have the money to go to Dairy Queen or the new Village Station. When people have less money in their pocket, they will give up the extras that normally go to the companies in our city.

Council Report:

Mr. Bicknell stated that JEMS has their board meeting last evening. There will be a report coming out from Chief Madden shortly. The Board did approve the RFQ for the new safety building which will be posted in the newspaper on February 10th. This will remain open until March 1st. JEMS did have two new hires this past week. Our Fire Chief Lane teaches at Butler Tech and was able to refer a couple of people from his class and they did work out for JEMS. They have been working on the amount of labor per shift. There has been some problems with staffing as all jobs are raising their starting salaries due to the labor shortage. Chief Madden and his lieutenants decided to go from a seven person roster per shift to a six person roster. They will still be able to operate all three ambulances on each shift but also can raise the wages by \$2/person. None of this will add to the budget and they will be able to offer better wages for incoming employees. JEMS had a large run sheet from January with a total of 210 runs. 70 of those runs were in Carlisle, 19 runs were mutual aid to surrounding areas and only 5 mutual aids were received and those were due to all ambulances being out at the same time. Staff is lean but they are efficient. During the recent snow storm, he was impressed with the response of all staff. He was impressed by the looks of our snow plows and trucks. They look brand new due to the level of detail that our Service Director, Mr. Casson, and his employees give to these vehicles. He can't thank them enough for their level of professionalism.

Mr. Kilpatrick stated that he spent a decade in upper state New York and plowed a lot of deep snow and this was one of the top storms simply because of how it came down. He appreciates our service department for everything that they did. It may have been a bit slower than what people wanted to see

but that was due to how it fell as well as the inability to pre-treat due to the rain first. He asks everyone to stay safe and as the thaw begins, remember that black ice will develop across the roads.

Mrs. Kemper thanked Linda Oda for coming this evening. She had some great information for residents. She thanked all of the residents that came out this evening to voice their opinions on this tax issue. She appreciates all of the comments made and she knows it is a very difficult time. She also thanked our service department as this past week was a rough one for them. She appreciates everything that they did in getting the streets cleared. She wanted to remind residents that since now we are a city, the plowing of State Route 123 does fall to us. She gave a shout-out to our Carlisle Historical Society. There was a nice article in the Franklin Chronicle this past week. She spoke to the treasurer, Betty McQueen, and they have been remodeling. You can become a member of the Carlisle Historical Society for \$10 which goes directly towards the maintenance. They just installed blinds which will help protect some of the historical items. You can go to www.carlisleareahistory.org or to the Facebook page to get more information about their membership. Our Governor has declared Sunday, February 13th as Cincinnati Bengals Day and encourages everyone to wear their orange and black.

Mr. Stivers can personally vouch for the ease of getting a military/veteran's ID that Mrs. Oda spoke of earlier. This service was at the Franklin Township building several years ago and was able to take advantage of it with all of the resources that they have on that mobile unit. He also used the veterans services to obtain his DD214 late last year and that was also very easy. With the snow storm last week, the equipment used and being down one man, he commends them for their work. There is a method to the madness of plowing. Even living on a secondary cul-de-sac, his road was plowed at least once by the next day. They hit a lot of area in a short amount of time with a short amount of staff in old trucks. At this risk of being hated, he is a Steeler's fan but he will proudly say "Who-Dey" on Sunday and will be rooting for the Bengals.

Mrs. Bilbrey applauded all of the pop-up shops in the area that are selling Bengals gear for the Super Bowl. She had to grab some Bengal items for friends in Canada and she was so happy that those little shops were there. She congratulated the Carlisle wrestling teams. She is very impressed with all of the postings she is seeing. She thanked Linda Oda for coming this evening and sharing all of services provided to residents of Warren County by the Recorder's Office. She would like to promote the free services on our website and/or Facebook page. She defended our service department on social media and thanked everyone who also backed them up. She cannot imagine being them right now with no sleep and the pressure put on them. She congratulated Gross Lumber as the Business of the Month. This business is a great asset to our town and was one of the founding businesses in the area. Jamie Gross's relative was one of the first councilmembers of Carlisle and it is great to have that history. She thanked the Gross family in its entirety. She thanked the residents for showing up tonight. She knows this is a tough situation for everyone. We might not end the day seeing eye-to-eye, but she likes that we can respect each other's differences. No one on this Council is taking this issue lightly. All bills are being increased and most of them are nothing that we can control. Timing is horrible and there is nothing positive that can be said about that but she appreciates and hears everyone's concerns.

Mr. Humphries spoke in regard to social media. It seems as though there are several people out there with all of the answers. He would like to let those individuals know that we have seats open on various boards and commissions to come and serve. There is also always room in the audience and there is a microphone to come and speak. If you could not deprive us of all of your wisdom, he would appreciate

that. More recently, residents have been reaching out to him to remind him of what he is here to do and he would like to thank them. There are open seats on the Park & Recreation Board and a few others so there is room at the decision table. We also have the Charter Review Committee that meet every five years. Our Charter is the "bible" of our community as to who we are and how we are run. We will need at least nine people and only three have shown interest. It is a bit labor intensive for several meetings but you would have your hands in the pie to make this community. This would be a great opportunity to be involved with your community.

Mayor's Report:

Mayor Winkler thanked Council for excusing him from the last meeting. He had Covid and it was a mild case so he was over it fairly quickly. Unfortunately, his wife also caught it but she did okay with it as well. He congratulated the two new members to the Carlisle Athletic Hall of Fame, Dr. David Langdon who was a basketball player at Carlisle and is now a dentist in Vandalia, Ohio; and Wayne Clark who was a 1972 graduate who went on to be an educator, principal, teacher, coach and mentor and lives in the Batavia area now. Eddie Crowe is a wonderful person who is making the best of the tough things going on in his life right now and the new high school gymnasium has been named in his honor. Eddie has been a friend for many, many years and he felt this was a great honor for all of these individuals. The gentleman who was suppose to introduce Wayne Clark could not make it due to weather so, at the last minute, he was asked to introduce him. It was his pleasure to do so and he wishes he would have been a bit more prepared but they got through it.

Manager's Report:

Mrs. Duffy did want to clarify a few statements made in earlier conversations. Mayor Winkler had indicated that the city has a pending sewer project from Crescent Lane to Union Road. That project is actually from Dayton-Oxford Road to Union Road. Also, an individual that mentioned he is getting a water bill while on a well. Water is only billed to those connected to the water system. Each home connected to the public sewer system does get a utility bill from it. If you are receiving a utility bill and need any clarification or have questions, please call our Utility Clerk, as we are only wanting to charge you for the services you are receiving. It could be a simple matter of coding on the bill that may make it look like it is water versus sewer. The feasibility study with Franklin Township and JEMS has produced a final draft and each entity will receive one hard copy of the book. Each Chief did receive their copy. Chief Lane has looked it over. There are not a lot of substantial changes from the draft but she does have it now for her own review. Chief Lane has requested an electronic copy so it can be distributed. Each entity received individual feedback and information about recommendations to improve their services as well as what a joint venture could potentially look like with a few options. Council will get an opportunity to see once staff has reviewed it. Our fire department has been very active in recruiting and training volunteers that we have currently. They are trying to accommodate the various schedules and have begun to change around some training times. Historically, trainings have been held on Monday evenings but that does not work with all of our volunteer's schedules who do work multiple jobs. They are now looking at adding some trainings sessions on Saturdays. There are four new volunteers in process. Offers have been made to them which puts them to their next step of pre-employment physicals and screenings. Once those results are back, we will be able to add more to our volunteer staff. As volunteers, they get paid a very, very small amount for what they give to this community so it is a good thing to know that people are still wanting to come here and train which is

also a testament to the quality that our Chief and Assistant Chief provide. Town Hall will be closed on Monday, February 21st in observance of President’s Day. As always, our safety services do not get a day off. If you have an emergency, do not hesitate to call 9-1-1. First Reading of Ordinances and Resolutions:

RES. 1-22 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MANAGER TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH WARREN COUNTY ENGINEER’S OFFICE FOR PURCHASE OF ROAD SALT AND ON AS A SINGLE READING.

Mrs. Duffy explained that this resolution would give her the authority on behalf of the city to enter into a cooperative purchase agreement with Warren County and various entities to purchase road salt for the 2022-2023 winter season. This has been a great program that we have participated in for several years. Last year, 16 jurisdictions including Franklin and Franklin Township participated and it is all about purchase power. The higher tonnage of salt that we can go together and buy, the better per ton price that we can all benefit from. Historically, the City of Carlisle did at one time buy salt on our own and we saw significant savings per ton when we were invited in to this cooperative purchase agreement. The City regularly purchases around 600 tons of road salt each year and that is about 2%

of the total road salt that this cooperative agreement actually purchases. It is on for a single reading as we need to let Warren County know that we are planning to participate in time for them to submit the necessary paperwork.

Mr. Stivers asked if it was approved last year to make this approval good for a three year period allowing her to enter into this agreement. He may be wrong but he feels it was on this topic that he remembers. Mrs. Duffy remembers that being a topic of discussion but does not recall Council taking action on it. She will need to look back through the minutes. For now, she would rather have double legislation if that were the case but she believes that Warren County does need approval each year.

Mrs. Kemper made a motion to suspend the rules requiring three readings, and have one reading by title only, seconded by Mr. Stivers.

ORD. 2-22 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CARLISLE ZONING MAP TO CHANGE THE ZONING CLASSIFICATION OF +/- 30.726 ACRES AT CENTRAL AVENUE FROM A-1 AGRICULTURE DISTRICT TO R-2 SINGLE FAMILY DISTRICT.

Mrs. Cathy Walton explained that this legislation is a request from Associate Construction to amend the zoning classification of approximately 30 acres containing two parcels on Central Avenue. There is just over 7.5 acres in Montgomery County and 23 acres in Warren County. These parcels are currently zoned A-1 agricultural, and the request is to have zoned R-2 single family residence. The purpose of this request is to continue construction of the Eagle Ridge subdivision.

This legislation will be on for a third and final reading on February 22, 2022.

Second and Third Readings of Ordinances and Resolutions:

ORD. 28-21 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 881.081 OF THE CARLISLE TAXATION CODE OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES.

Mayor Winkler explained that this legislation was tabled at the December 7, 2021 meeting. For Council's information, in order to bring this from the table for further discussion, a motion must be made by Mrs. Kemper, Mr. Stivers, or Mr. Humphries. If one of those three make a motion to bring it off the table, then any other member may make a second, vote will be taken and Council may then discuss it further. After the discussion, there will be a final vote. If none of these three members decide to bring it from the table, it will be considered failed.

There were no motions made to bring the legislation from the table so Ordinance 28-21 is considered a failed issue.

Mayor Winkler stated that this concludes their regular business for the evening. Council will be moving into Executive Session to discuss possible purchase or sale of property. There will be no action to follow.

Mr. Stivers made a motion to enter into Executive Session, seconded by Mrs. Kemper.
