Council Report:

Introducing our children to the Policeman and Firemen in a safe and fun environment will help them when emergencies arise. Mr. Bicknell reminded everyone that school begins next Wednesday, August 17th. Mrs. Kemper dittoed that National Night Out was awesome. She thanked Police, Fire, Warren County, Franklin Township, all of the businesses who donated as well as staff. Last week she attended the Miami Valley Planning Commission meeting. This was their first time at the City of Dayton Riverscape

She encourages everyone to go check it out. There are a lot of things happening in Carlisle over the next few weeks. Food Trucks are still gathering every Thursday at Roscoe Roof Park from 6:00pm – 9:00pm. This provides a quick treat for busy families on Thursday evenings and they have a couple new trucks each week. She reminded everyone that next Thursday, August 18th, is the Cruise In and Concert at the Village Station shopping center from 5:00pm – 8:00pm. Railroad Days will be this coming Friday and Saturday. Anyone can be in the parade on Saturday morning. Line-up begins at Roscoe Roof Park. She wishes the Teachers and Students a great school year. Please be safe and cautious of the speed limits.

Mayor's Report:

Mayor Winkler thanked Chief Rogers, the Police Department and everyone involved for a very successful National Night Out. It was great to be able to talk to so many people. He appreciates all of the hard work that was put in to this event. School does begin on the 17th and Carlisle's first football game is Friday, August 19th. He encourages everyone to come out and support the kids at their first game of the season.

Manager's Report:

Julie Duffy gave a big thank you to our Police Department for a successful National Night Out. This is wonderful event to help bridge the gap bringing the community together and allowing them to know their Police Department. In Carlisle, when this event first began, it was important for our Police Department to help the community understand that safety is more than just their department. The Police serve us 24/7, all Holidays, rain or shine, evenings and weekends. Our local event likes to capture more of the emergency services and includes both our Service and Fire Departments. We also work together with Franklin Township, City of Franklin, Warren County, as well as Warren County Water & Soil. Because of that, we include all of these entities as safety is the Police Department plus more. She gave a big shout-out to Officer Czarnota who has been in charge of this event for a number of years and really puts in a lot work. Chief Rogers and Clerk, Becky Estes, also help prepare for this event. On the Police Department's Facebook page, there is a very long post recognizing and thanking all of the individuals/entities who donated time, money, services and resources to help make this event successful. It is more than just one individual and more than just one department. As we begin another start to the school year, please be patient. There are more than likely new staff members who are figuring their way around the campus along with all of the students. There will be new bus drivers learning their way around town, new parents bringing new students and new young drivers heading to school. It normally takes a few weeks to work out all of the kinks and there will be two first days as the kindergartener/preschool students begin a bit later than everyone else. Please be patient as we all move through these next couple of weeks. The City has been notified by CSX that there will be a team coming through our town at the beginning of September to do some work on the railroad crossings. While they are here working their way down the line, there will be temporary closures at crossings in town. Patience will once again be a main focus during these repairs. This is a large maintenance project for CSX to keep the line running safely. At the end of August, they will begin to drop supplies in those areas. We expect them to be in town on September 6th to make repairs. They have already determined that they will not close Central and Fairview crossings at the same time. However, they will be closing Fairview and Union at the same time. They do recognize that Central needs an easier

detour so while they are working there, they will leave Fairview open. They will not be working on the Beachler or Martz-Paulin crossings during this time. Those two should remain open at all times other than when the supplies are coming in via train cars. If anything changes with this schedule, we will let the community know. The Warren County Engineer's Office has also been notified as this work will be more than just within our community. Repairs will be happening along all of the CSX line in this area so there may be other temporary closures as you travel throughout the surrounding areas. They have not relayed how long each crossing will be closed while repairs are being completed. They usually move fairly quickly with crossing repairs and we do not expect them to take very long while they are here.

Committee Report:

Mr. Bicknell gave a report of the Public Safety Committee that met just before tonight's meeting. There were two items discussed. The first was the issue of ATVs and side-by-side vehicles. The Committee has instructed staff to reach out to surrounding communities for how they handle these types of vehicles. Perhaps they can share verbiage to help amend our current ordinance. The second issue was that of motorized scooters/bicycles. The Committee did request for more information from surrounding communities to help us make some decisions moving forward.

First Reading of Ordinances and Resolutions:

RES. 9-22 A RESOLUTION APPROVING PARTICIPATION IN REGION 14 GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE UNDER THE ONEOHIO MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AND ON AS A SINGLE READING.

Mrs. Duffy explained that this is legislation related to a very large settlement amount from pharmaceutical companies as it relates with the opioid epidemic. The State of Ohio sued them and there was a large settlement agreement. There are lots of layers to this agreement. The money

received is to be channeled into three individual pots. One would be going directly to local entities and Council already took action to formerly participate in that settlement accepting the money. There is a later piece of legislation that Mr. Rushing will speak about as to how we will keep track of the monies received as part of this settlement. Another pot of this money is earmarked toward regions. There are a total of 19 regions within the state. The counties that house the largest cities are their own region. Carlisle is part of Region 14 which encompasses eight counties. There are pots of money that will be funneled to each of these regions. Although we do have a small portion of our community within Montgomery County, we are shown solely in Region 14. The legislation that is before Council is to have Region 14 government structure adopted for all entities within its umbrella. There are bylaws developed that will help to provide this government structure on how they will begin taking in the money and what they will eventually do with it. This is a work in process and it will take many years for the money to be officially distributed. This is one step. The legislation tonight is to formally accept the bylaws on behalf of Carlisle that were written to determine the government structure. Each county that is part of Region 14 has agreed that the governance board will be compromised of one county commissioner appointed by the county, an appointment by the municipality within the county of the largest population who will serve as the voice of all municipalities in that county, as well as the president of the county township association or designee to help give township entities a voice in this process. The needs of the township may be different than the needs of the municipality. There will also be subject matter experts who will be part of it as needed. These may consist of education, emergency services, legal or medial counseling, mental health, public health and other participants. The legislation has been reviewed by all of the county entities to help establish the framework for Region 14 to operate. It is being asked to be adopted as a single reading to help expedite this process and we can formally indicate that Council is in agreement with the bylaws that have been adopted by Region 14 at this point. As it progresses throughout the years, there may be tweaks needed here or there based on the needs of the region.

Mr. Kilpatrick asked for clarification on whether this resolution will be only for the disbursement of this money or are they giving up any other rights or responsibilities. Mrs. Duffy explained that we are agreeing to the terms that the Region has come up with which are similar to their bylaws. There will be a lot more topics about how the funds should be distributed and how that process will look for individuals to apply for support. Currently this is about who has an official voice at the table moving forward.

ORD. 14-22 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE ONEOHIO OPIOD SETTLEMENT FUND NO. 233 AND IS ON AS A SINGLE READING.

Mr. Ryan Rushing passed out information related to the City’s last audit. The State Auditor’s Office has a new rating program for transparency and openness to government. He is happy to report that the City has received a certificate of outstanding achievement for open and transparent government. This is a new program in which the State will be continually auditing us moving forward. We have exceeded the transparency and openness of government.

The State of Ohio has mentioned that it did reach an \$808 Million settlement with the three largest distributors of opioids as it relates to the epidemic and part of this money will come directly all local jurisdictions within the state of Ohio. Almost a year ago, Carlisle Council enacted Resolution 9-21 agreeing to be part of the Memorandum of Understanding for going after this settlement if it was awarded. At that time, it was uncertain if the settlement would be awarded but now it has been awarded. The City of Carlisle will receive a small portion of the \$808 Million settled throughout the entire State of Ohio. Our portion is estimated at \$16,449.16. These dollars can only be spent primarily on education, outreach and communication about opioids and other illicit drugs. He knows that our Police Chief and department will develop ideas on how to best utilize these outreach efforts and communication within our community. Albeit small, it is money that we don’t have to ask for from our residents and money that we use to education our community. Pursuant to ORC 5705.09(f), we are required to establish a fund for any revenue the city receives as it is special outside of general property tax. This ordinance would simply create fund number 233 – The OneOhio Opioid Settlement Fund. This will allow us to receipt all portions of the monies from this settlement. This will come in over a several year disbursement and will not be received all at once. We have received our first receipt which was \$730. This could potentially take up to 18 years for the total disbursement to be received. The best use of this money will most likely be the printing of pamphlets and other educational communication and outreach. This legislation establishes the fund and will receipt the money accordingly.

ORD. 15-22 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CARLISLE CODE OF CODIFIED ORDINANCES AND ADD SECTION 244.05 - LAW ENFORCEMENT FUND POLICY (1st Reading)

Mr. Rushing explained that this legislation would adopt a policy for law enforcement fund. On our books we do have a law enforcement fund that is prescribed by the Ohio Revised Code to receipt and disburse any monies related to any asset forfeiture or other sorts of forfeited property related to the activities of law enforcement. For many years, this fund has been stagnant. However, we have received \$20,066.35 from some recent law enforcement activity in combination with the Warren County Drug Task Force, Carlisle Police Department and the Warren County Sheriff's Office. Pursuant to ORC 2981.13(C)(2)(a), we have to adopt a formal policy about the uses that we can expend these monies on. Most of this language is copied directly from the Ohio Revised Code as there are only certain items we can use these funds for, primarily, education, community outreach as well as D.A.R.E. programs if available in the community. This policy will be a new chapter underlying our Police Department and codified to establish the law enforcement fund's policies and procedures. The Ohio Revised Code does require an annual report submittal to Council by the Police Chief and Finance Director on any law enforcement activities in the fund no later than January 31st. If any portion is utilized throughout the year, it will be shown in the annual report.

With no further discussion, this Ordinance will be on for a second reading on August 23, 2022.

ORD. 16-22 AN ORDINANCE TO MAKE REAPPROPRIATION/SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF CARLISLE DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2022, AMENDMENT NUMBER 5 AND IS ON AS A SINGLE READING.

Mr. Rushing explained that there are two supplemental appropriation requests in this ordinance. The first is for an air conditioning unit that went out here in City Hall. There are three units in this building. One unit controls the temperature for the first floor offices as well as the basement. A second unit controls the temperature for the Council room, restrooms, break room and foyer. A third unit controls the temperature on the second floor. The second unit is the one that is leaking and is over 20 years old and will need to be replaced. Due to the age of the unit and the building being a three-phase electric set-up, it does need to be a specific grade of commercial air conditioning unit. Our third-party vendor has recommended replacing this unit with an estimate of approximately \$7,200. However, our vendor is currently having issues with sourcing the unit so there is an additional \$800 in case we have to go outside our traditional set of vendors to find a comparable unit. The total request is for \$8,000 to replace this a/c unit. The second-floor unit was replaced in 2010 and the first floor office unit was replaced in 2020. The second appropriation is for a small portion of town where we own and maintain all of the street lights. This area is in the Colonial Village Apartments. There was a light pole hit and damaged completely. Without knowing the party who did it, we are unable to have an insurance claim against another party. We will have to expense the monies to replace this light pole. It was quoted at \$4,155 and we are exploring whether or not we will file an insurance claim under our own policy. Either way, the monies have to be expended first and then could possibly be reimbursed by insurance. If there is a claim filed, we would be less the deductible but have to appropriate the full value as the money coming in will be a revenue.

ORD. 17-22 AN ORDINANCE ACCEPTING THE FINAL PLAT FOR PARCELS 01331010160 AND 0133101015 AND CONFIRMING THE DEDICATION OF RIGHTS OF WAY AND IS ON AS A SINGLE READING.

Mrs. Cathy Walton explained that this legislation is a request from Casey’s marketing company to consolidate two parcels. The first is at the corner of Central Avenue and Lomar and the second is adjacent to the first on Lomar. Casey’s recently purchased these parcels in anticipation of constructing a gas station with a convenience store. They have received all approvals for the development and this is the final approval required before construction may begin. It was presented to Planning Commission at their April 7th meeting and their recommendation to Council is approval of the consolidation. She and a representative of Casey’s is available this evening for any questions.

Mayor Winkler stated that this concludes the items on their agenda. Council will be entering into Executive Session to discuss possible appointment(s) to the Zoning Board of Appeals. There will be possible action to follow.

Mr. Humphries asked that Council please direct Staff to begin accepting the letters of interest and resumes for the vacant Council seat. Mrs. Duffy explained that our Charter, Section 4.05(b), does provide the process for filling Council vacancies. The current language dictates that the vacancy must be filled within 60 days and does require a majority vote of remaining Council. If the vacancy is not filled within those 60 days, the Mayor is compelled to fill the vacancy immediately following the end of the 60 days. With this in mind, there would be three regular meetings of Council between now and the expiration of 60 days. Council always has the ability to have a special meeting with advanced public notice. Her recommendation is for Council to consider posting the vacancy through the end of August. She knows this is a busy time for a lot of residents with school beginning. This would give Council the month of September to consider applications and schedule interviews. Ultimately, it is Council's decision as to how they choose to schedule the time. Mayor Winkler was in agreement with Mrs. Duffy and suggested that Council plan to have an appointment by the second meeting in September. Mrs. Duffy stated that she and Mayor Winkler will be out of town during the first meeting in September as they will be representing the community with the Warren County Chamber Alliance held in Washington D.C. Mr. Bicknell suggested that interviews be held on off-Council nights when they come in as these normally can take 30-45 minutes per candidate. He remembers completing two rounds of interviews in the past as to give candidates some instruction on what to bring to them for consideration. Mrs. Duffy explained that as applications come in, staff will vet them to be sure they meet the minimum qualifications through a general election. She reminded them that this candidate would fill the remaining term of Mrs. Bilbrey as she just recently began this term. Staff will prepare advertisements of the announcement and send it to Council for their review tomorrow. All Council Members were in agreement.




